Conoly Brooks remembers a rainy day when he parked outside and ducked into the Surety Title building at 136 W. Twohig to do business. He was aware that the title building has indoor parking for employees. As he waited in the lobby for his appointment he looked across the street and thought "I wonder if that vacant building at 135 West Twohig is

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large enough to include covered parking for employees?" This is how the vision for "The Mercantile" began.

The history on this structure

started with construction of the original Sears and Roebuck Department Store in 1929. The retail chain store opened in 1931. Wood Motor Company and Used Cars (Ford Dealership) occupied the building from 1934 -1941. The Western Wool and Mohair Company moved in in 1942. Additional businesses at this location included Harry's Food Store (1946) and Christians in Action (2007).

The property was donated to Downtown San Angelo, Inc., (DSA) in 2013. DSA, a Main Street organization, worked to find a developer that would restore the building and bring new life to this historic structure. A significant objective of the Main Street Program is Historic Preservation. This includes

Mr. Brooks stated that Downtown San Angelo, Inc. and The Bank & Trust were instrumental in helping him to launch the project.

Conoly Brooks stated, "One of the proudest accomplishments of working on this project is that all of our available spaces were leased months before the construction was completed".

MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

What an incredible 2016 for downtown San Angelo and Downtown San Angelo, Inc.!

The lack of residential living in the central business district is moving towards reaching our goal to increase downtown living. The Roosevelt Hotel at 50 N. Chadbourne was purchased by Fireside Partners LLC to be developed. Upon completion the former hotel will become the Roosevelt Lofts. The transformation of this historic building into living space will be a first step in continuation of our number one goal of increasing the downtown residential population. Having people living downtown creates a dynamic that stimulates economic opportunities and draws new businesses to serve the needs of those who choose to live downtown.

Two major institutions with long histories in our community and downtown have expanded their presence in the central business district with new buildings. The 1st Financial Bank's new building at the corner of Concho Avenue and Koenigheim/Bryant Blvd. will create a gateway into historic downtown. Shannon Medical Center continues to grow and develop and has added a new \$27 million 4 story Medical Office building.

What was originally the Coca-Cola warehouse is now the beautiful San Angelo Performing Arts Center. This creative repurposing of a building located at 82 Gillis Street was dedicated on September 8, 2016 and promises to be an entertainment destination for not only our community but all of West Texas and beyond.

Another key development that is changing the North Chadbourne corridor has been the purchase and development of nine (9) buildings between 12 and 38 N. Chadbourne by the David Mazur Construction Company. Within months of the purchase remodeling and restoring of the structures commenced. These refurbished buildings will bring new businesses and create employment opportunities within the downtown area.

The Historic Downtown Magazine released on March 24, 2017 will feature the transformation of 135 W. Twohig. Depending on which era you grew-up in or arrived in San Angelo you will either call it the Sears & Roebuck building, "the Old Harry's Food Store, or maybe "one of the Christian In Actions building". Today, it's simply called "The Mercantile". The building was donated to DSA, Inc. and sold to Conoly and Heidi Brooks who have renovated the building into office and retail space with indoor parking while maintaining the historic integrity of the historic building.

In 2016 we welcomed the

following new business to downtown: Burlap and Paisley, Amaryllis, Angry Cactus, Casual Pint, Chadbourne Tavern, Chandler's Bar and Grill, Jesse Rose Mercantile, Peepsi's BBQ, Leo's Import, The SOCO Taphouse Company, If Walls Could Talk, All About You Barber & Beauty Salon, Paint & Sip, ARock Sa-Ion, The Latest Scoop, Solar CenTex, Coffee 101, The Turn and Warehouse 150.

We also added new sponsors for our Sheep Spectacular project: Surety Title, Stephen's Central Library, Episcopal Church of the Good Shepherd, Henry's Diner, Market Street, West Central Wireless, KIDY FOX, Rio Concho Manor and Window Depot.

Working with our economic partners in 2017 will be another important priority. The San Angelo Chamber of Commerce Economic Development, the City of San Angelo Development Corporation, the Angelo State **University - Small Business Development Center, Workforce** Solutions, San Angelo Convention Visitors & Bureau, Howard College and Angelo State University provide alternative paths for us to address the issues communities face in the process of bringing businesses and development into their communities. Through this coalition we will strengthen our resources and effectiveness in the future of downtown San Angelo.

VAULT DOOR RELOCATED ONCE AGAIN

As 1st Financial Bank staff prepare to move from the 301 W. Beauregard location to the new site on Concho Avenue, a long standing iconic vault door is first to be transported. This vault access entry has been a part of the bank's history beginning in 1927 when the vault was installed at the San Angelo National Bank location at 201 S. Chadbourne. Today, Trimble Batjer Insurance Associates occupy the building .

The door was moved in 1962/63 from the basement

of that building up through the sidewalk and street. It was then installed at the 301 W. Beauregard site.

On Monday, March 27, 2017 at 5:00 pm the door was once again moved to the new bank building at the corner of Concho Ave. and Koenigheim. The crane used to move the vault door registered the weight of the door at 27,000 pounds.
